

Proclamation By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS; over 244,000 people lose their lives every year to lung cancer; and

WHEREAS; lung cancer is not just a smoker's disease, it affects everyone no matter your gender, race or age; and

WHEREAS; the largest segment of the population being diagnosed with lung cancer today are young, otherwise healthy, non-smoking females; and

WHEREAS; although lung cancer takes more lives each year than colon, breast and prostate cancer combined, it receives only a fraction of federal research funding dollars due in part to the stigma of smoking that is attached to it; and

WHEREAS; due to a lack of recommended screenings for lung cancer, until very recently, it is not diagnosed in the early stages, when a cure is more likely and; because it's symptoms are vague and there is very little pain until the later stages, it is very often misdiagnosed for extended periods of time; and

WHEREAS; promotion, advocacy and awareness are of utmost importance in making lung cancer less deadly and more treatable;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim November 2018, as

Lung Cancer Awareness Month

in the State of Alabama.
