

Proclamation

By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, Pancreatic Cancer is the 3rd leading cause of cancer-related death in the United States surpassing breast cancer; and

WHEREAS, it is expected to become the 2nd leading cause of cancer-related death in the US by the year 2020, surpassing colorectal cancer, and

WHEREAS, in 2019 an estimated 56,770 Americans will be diagnosed with pancreatic cancer in the U.S., and more than 45,750 will die from the disease; and

WHEREAS, Pancreatic Cancer has the highest mortality rate of all major cancers; and

WHEREAS, for all stages combined, 91% of pancreatic cancer patients will die within five years of diagnosis – only 9% will survive more than five years; and

WHEREAS, Pancreatic Cancer is one of the few cancers for which survival has not improved substantially for more than 40 years; and

WHEREAS, Pancreatic Cancer is a leading cause of cancer death largely because there are no detection tools to diagnose the disease in its early stages when surgical removal of the tumor is still possible; and

WHEREAS, on World Pancreatic Cancer Day 2019, people around the world unite to Demand Better in the fight against the world's toughest cancer, raising awareness about the symptoms and risks of the disease and the urgent need for earlier detection;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim November 21, 2019, as

Pancreatic Cancer Awareness Day

in the state of Alabama.
