

Proclamation

By the Governor of Alabama

WHEREAS, more than 55,000 Alabamians suffer from epilepsy. Approximately one in 10 people will have at least one unprovoked seizure at some point during their lifetime, and one in 26 will develop full blown epilepsy; and

WHEREAS, it is estimated that more than three million individuals worldwide have been diagnosed with epilepsy, and there is currently no cure; and

WHEREAS, epilepsy is the fourth most common neurological disease and impacts our most vulnerable populations, that of children and seniors; and

WHEREAS, lavender is the international color for epilepsy and is also a color that symbolizes solitude. The goal of Epilepsy Awareness Month is to increase awareness to the general public, to reduce the social stigma endured by many individuals with epilepsy and to empower individuals living with epilepsy to take action in their communities; and

WHEREAS, November is recognized nationally as Epilepsy Awareness Month;

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Kay Ivey, Governor of Alabama, do hereby proclaim November 2023, as

Epilepsy Awareness Month
